TRI COUNTY LEAGUE GOOD SPORTSMANSHIP GUIDELINES

Continued improvement of sportsmanship at interscholastic activities should be the goal of everyone. Good sportsmanship is not merely a campaign; it is the essence of what we are about in interscholastic athletics. Good sportsmanship should be in our thoughts in every practice and in every contest, and in every situation that has anything to do with our programs.

1. First and foremost, good sports-that is really good sports- remember in all circumstances that the interscholastic athletic program is provided for the education of students more than for the entertainment of the public.
2. Good sports keep competition and its results in proper perspective. If one's participation in athletics is at the expense of another's self-esteem, the program can't be justified in a school setting. Every effort shall be made to not run up the score on another team.
3. Good sports refrain from booing opponents or officials, and from chanting "air ball", "you, you, you", and other jeers. Really good sports stop other fans from doing this. They know that during a serve in volleyball or a free throw in basketball, there should be silence among the crowd.
4. Good sports remember that sportsmanship begins long before the contest starts.
 - A. It begins with administrators telling coaches when they are hired what it is they expect from coaches in the way of sportsmanship.
 - B. It continues with constant reminders for all students through school communications and publications.
 - C. It begins with coaches insisting that athletes practice with good sportsmanship in every contest.
5. Good sportsmanship lasts long after the contest is over.
 - A. Good sports respect the property of others by not causing damage to equipment or facilities.
 - B. Good sports know that school officials have the right to keep fans from attending athletic events if their conduct is not appropriate.
6. **GOOD SPORTSMANSHIP IS THE RESPONSIBILITY OF EVERYONE.**
 - A. It is the administrator's and athletic director's responsibility to continually inform all coaches of the league's S.O.P.'s, including sportsmanship guidelines.
 - B. It is the coach's responsibility to educate and inform their athletes of appropriate operating procedures and good sportsmanship.
 - C. As a representative of the school, athletes have a responsibility to parents, school, community, and self in exhibiting good sportsmanship.
 - D. All of the above (administrators, coaches, and participants) have a responsibility to publicize and communicate to parents and fans the importance of everyone abiding by the league guidelines for sportsmanship.
7. **LEAGUE PHILOSOPHY FOR ACTION PERTAINING TO INCIDENTS OF POOR SPORTSMANSHIP**
 - A. Any incident of poor sportsmanship should first and foremost be communicated, worked out, and corrected by the Athletic Directors of the schools involved.
 - B. If agreement cannot be reached between the Athletic Directors involved, the principals of the schools involved are to communicate to attempt to resolve the situation.
 - C. If agreement still cannot be reached between the athletic directors and/or principals of the schools involved, a sportsmanship incident report (see Tri Count League handbook) is to be filled out by the complainant and sent to the chairman of the league.
 - D. When an incident report is received, the chairman of the league will attempt to resolve the differences between the schools involved.
 - E. If the chairman of the league cannot resolve the differences between the schools, the matter will come before the general body of the league for action at the next scheduled league meeting.

GENERAL STANDARD OPERATION PROCEDURES

1. No league trophies to be awarded in the Tri-County League.
2. A school planning to use any field, playing area, or equipment other than what is in our S.O.P., should notify visiting schools immediately.
3. Starting time changes: Schools must notify the other school at least two days in advance on starting time changes.
4. Check with home team on availability of dressing and showering facilities.
5. Home team schedules all officials. Whenever possible, they shall be certified and may not be members of the faculty of the home school.
6. The home team scorebook will be the official score. Whenever possible, an adult should keep score.
7. The home team furnishes an adult timer when possible.
8. The home team will call the visiting team by 1:00 p.m. if necessary to cancel game for weather conditions. These games will be made up on open dates available.
9. Athletes will wear the uniform in their school colors or be disqualified from the event.
10. Coaches are encouraged to have current first aid cards.
11. Spandex shorts will be allowed **UNDER THE UNIFORM** as long as the colors are the schools.
12. Non-playing teams will stay with their coaches when they are not on the floor.
13. In hot weather outdoors, home team coaches need to be aware of water needs for both teams.
14. ALL SCHOOLS WILL SEND A REPRESENTATIVE TO ALL LEAGUE MEETINGS.

TRI-COUNTY LEAGUE

Boys' and Girls' Soccer

1. National Federation Rules shall be in effect, unless amended by the SOP's below.
2. Games will start at 4 p.m. unless the affected schools mutually agree upon a change. Games will start at 3:30 p.m. after the daylight savings time change.
3. School practice may not be held before Labor Day.
4. All matches will consist of two 40-minute halves. Halftime will be ten minutes. Tie scores will remain unbroken.
5. Schools will provide two fields, one for boy's games and one for girl's games. Any change must be by mutual agreement.
6. The home team will provide a minimum of one adult official for each game.
7. The home team will provide a regulation size 5 leather ball.
8. Athletic directors or designee's may arrange time-outs by mutual agreement before the match.
9. Home teams will wear white jerseys and visiting teams will wear dark jerseys unless a change is mutually agreed upon. Penney's may be used if needed.
10. Players must wear shin guards.
11. Teams will consist of seventh and eighth graders divided by gender. Girls may play on boy's teams only needed to complete a team. Sixth graders may play but not supplant seventh or eighth graders.
12. Boys may play on girls' teams only to complete a team and must be reserve players from the boy's team. This will be done only if the girls' team is short players that game. Boys may not play up front.
13. A team may start with nine or ten players, but must notify their opponent in advance. The opponent will follow suit. If players are lost during the game, the opponent may stay at the original number. The game will be terminated if either team cannot field seven players.
14. Unlimited substitutions are allowed.
